SUMMARY

I am a bio-cultural anthropologist, specializing in how biology, the environment and culture come together to shape life history outcomes. My current work with **the Shenk Research Group** at Penn State is centered around seeking to understand how religion increases cooperation which can lead to higher fertility and greater social mobility. Previous research with the **Human Life History Project** in Finland sought to understand the impact of immigration on reproduction and social capital, while my time at the University of Missouri was spent analyzing the relationship between marriage practices and violence using an extraordinary database of previously uncontacted Yanomamo Indians from the Amazon rainforest. All of this research relies on Bayesian statistical techniques to analyze social networks and longitudinal, population-based genealogical databases in an attempt to understand how culture interacts with biology to produce human behavior .
